Clinical Quality Review Groups	CQRGs	Platform that brings together clinical leads, commissioners and quality leads from CCGs and trusts to discuss and make decisions on aspects of quality and safety.
Commissioning		Commissioning in the NHS is the process of ensuring that health and care services are provided effectively meet the needs of the population.

Equality Delivery System	EDS	Commissioned by the national Equality and Diversity Council in 2010, the Equality Delivery System helps NHS organisations improve the services they provide for their local communities and provide better working environments which are free of discrimination.
Equality Impact Needs Assessment	EINA	An Equality Impact Needs Assessment (EINA) is a systematic process which helps services identify where and how proposed policies or existing services could improve the way they serve the community.
